

One of the most important Salem Park Foundation programs is the growth of the Legacy Fund, a permanent funding source for Salem's parks. The Legacy Fund is invested by the Oregon Community Foundation and continues to grow at a steady rate. In the last 10 years, proceeds from the Pinot in the Parks event has added to the growth. Dr. Dan Saucy and his wife, Kathleen, host the event at their house. They donate the food and wine, so all proceeds raised go to build the Legacy Fund.

Pinot for the Parks is a fun event; a chance to meet fellow park lovers and learn about some very good wines. Participants taste a series of Pinot wines, score each one and find out if they agree with the results of the group. You also have the satisfaction of knowing that you have helped to grow a permanent funding source for Salem's parks.

Erik Jackson, Dan Chandler Nature Park Hero

Erik Jackson is an Eagle Scout from West Salem Troop 150. To earn his Eagle Scout rank, Erik planned a restoration project in Dan Chandler Nature Park to clear a specific area of invasive English Ivy and Himalayan Blackberry and to replace those cleared areas with native plants. He organized volunteers to carry out this plan. He included an educational component by designing, creating and placing identification pedestals next to the native plants.

As Erik explained to the West Salem Neighborhood Association, "My project is about educating people about the invasive species of plants, and native plants, and show before/after pictures where my Eagle Scout project has cleaned up that area. It took almost 2 years of time."

"I also created educational signs that are plastic resin-based screwed to a cedar plank and then placed beside native plants in the park, to assist with identification."

In September, Erik was awarded the Hornaday badge, a national environmental award given by Scouts B S A.. to recognize Scouts that have made significant contributions to conservation.

Young people caring for our parks means we will enjoy this important part of our communities for the next generation.

Kathleen Cooler, Wallace Marine Park hero

Kathleen Cooler walks three miles every day. Her route takes her past the landscaped area in the path leading to the Union Street Railroad Bridge. Four years ago, she noticed that this area was overgrown with weeds and contained litter. She called the City of Salem to ask about the neglected area, and was told that the City did not have enough staff to maintain all the areas in the parks. So Kathleen, an admitted perfectionist and park lover, be-



gan her commitment to beautify this corner of Wallace Marine Park. Three times a week, she wheels her box of tools to the park. She weeds, trims the shrubbery, picks up the litter, rakes the area smooth and adds bark mulch if necessary. She uses her own tools, purchases her own materials, and does the hard work necessary to keep this area well maintained. Kathleen feels strongly that if people want a good parks system, they need to get personally involved. It doesn't get more personal than this. When asked how she would improve Salem's parks, she is quick to say that she would like the City to be able to have enough staff to adequately maintain the parks.

Kathleen has a background as a museum director and is interested in history, so it is fitting that her chosen project is in the shadow of the historic Union Street Railroad Bridge. Relocation may be in Kathleen's future, so she would like to find a volunteer who might continue her work.
