
You Can See the World From Riverfront Park...

...and it is falling apart. Salem Parks Foundation is excited to announce a major fundraising drive to restore the deteriorating Eco-Earth Globe in Riverfront Park.

Many Salem residents will remember the conversion of the industrial acid ball to the stunning Eco-Earth Globe that we see today. It was a significant community effort. Everyone from school art classes to folks eager to recognize and adopt a place or icon that held special significance for them took part in this amazing effort.

Time and the elements have taken a toll on this iconic art work and it is time to bring it back to its original glory. We are asking the community that loves Eco-Earth to step up and help with the restoration. It is a daunting task. We need your help to raise \$300,000 over the next two years. Once this goal is reached, the City will hire a professional restoration firm. Any unused funds will go toward a dedicated trust fund for ongoing maintenance. All donations help, no matter the size.

How did we get from here...

According to Wikepedia, the Eco-Earth Globe, sometimes referred to simply as Eco-Earth, is an outdoor structure depicting a globe, located in Riverfront Park in Salem, Oregon, in the United States. Completed in 2003, the globe was converted from an acid storage ball with a 26-foot (7.9m) diameter that previously belonged to Boise Cascade, a pulp and paper company. Conceived by Mayor Roger Gertenrich, the community art project was funded by community members and gifted to the City. According to Oregon Public Broadcasting,



the sculpture "was an opportunity for students, and talented volunteers from Salem's art community to collaborate and create hundreds of ceramic icons that represent and teach about different cultures." Mary P.D. Heintzman, a local art teacher and artist, served as the project's art director.



To here...

This dry description is accurate, as far as it goes. What it fails to capture is how personal this undertaking became. Thanks to Capi Lynn's November 1, 2021 article in the Statesman-Journal, donations are already starting. Notes accompanying these donations relate the effort and love that went into the Eco-Earth project. They capture the pride and passion that went into ideas, art work, administration, construction and execution for the conversion of the ball from industrial fixture to art work.

This was a project that united Salem across neighborhoods, political orientation, occupation and status. It truly brought everyone together and, if the letters and cards accompanying donations are any indication, it made many lasting memories.

It allowed donors and artists to literally put places and objects that were special to them on the map. Families donated to remember their heritage. Individuals donated to honor countries, oceans, and animals. They created an amazing icon that has a place in our hearts and minds and helps our imaginations to remember that we live on a very special planet.

Riverfront Park has become the people's park. Organizations small and large have raised millions of dollars to create a roll call of incredible projects: restoration of the Union Street Railroad Bridge; the Carousel; the Rotary Pavilion; the Peter Courtney Bridge that now connects Riverfront Park to Minto Brown Island Park; the Gerry Frank Amphitheater that honors the heritage of the Kalapooya indigenous people and recognizes that we are not the first to consider this place special. The Eco Earth Globe was one of the first of these accomplishments and everyone that was involved remembers the work and excitement surrounding it. It epitomizes the spirit of community that is Salem.

Time, the elements, and lack of funding for art and park maintenance have combined to cause generalized deterioration to the Eco-Earth.


